- Fall River (Dave Weed and Marcia Picard) Lots of pending grant activity, including a round of funding that
 would allow for the hiring of a part-time garden coordinator for the upcoming season. Position will likely be 10
 hours/week and will seek to hire a Fall River resident. New gardens are likely to start up this year, including
 gardens on the Housing Authority Properties. The Watson School Garden has been a success to date; one goal is
 to eventually have gardens at every school in Fall River.
- New Bedford Serenity Gardens Project (Ginny Senna Davis) The Serenity Gardens project in the south end has been very successful. They currently have a waiting list for the 2010 growing season; and are looking forward to expanding the number of raised beds
- New Bedford LEADS Project (Jarrad Plante) Project with local middle schools and high schools in New Bedford and Fall River; teamed up with UMD Students. This spring they are focusing on sustainability and school gardens. Will be looking for guest speakers, field trips to local farms, etc.
- Community Gardens 2010 Calendar: Kudos to Nancy Kurtz for putting together a wonderful 2010 Calendar highlighting local community gardens. Nancy is willing to consider assembling a 2011 Calendar for next year; please consider taking photos during this upcoming growing season for future efforts.

It was suggested that we (food&ag working group) connect with SEEAL, UMD, and Claude Hoopes, who are working on developing a Southcoast Energy Challenge Campaign and website for launch in April 2010. It's been identified that home garden production is often one part of a foodshed analysis that is most difficult to measure because it's outside of the "economic" sphere of trade/sales data.

CFSC is launching a project to provide **free mentoring to four community food system organizations** interested in utilizing <u>Whole Measures for Community Food Systems (CFS)</u> to evaluate their impact. Selected organizations will work one-on-one with a mentor who will support their community with implementation of Whole Measures CFS. They also will **participate in a peer-learning group** to fine tune and reflect on their process, deepen learning across organizations, and explore innovative approaches to challenges. This work will occur mostly through conference calls and email exchanges, but participants will be invited to an in-person session in October 2010 in New Orleans.

CFSC is looking for organizations that are active in community food systems work; committed to evaluation, social justice, and participatory processes; and interested in working within their organization or community to implement a Whole Measures CFS evaluation.
